



Campus Aquino is a Catholic student and young professionals residential community in Utrecht. It seeks to gather young people who wish to grow in faith, character, study and work. Consisting in houses and apartments surrounding the Saint Gerard Majella church and the priory of the Brothers of Saint John, Campus Aquino offers a family-like environment based on faith, fellowship and formation, keys to the growth of each person. The concept has been successfully tried and tested since 2010, with nearly 80 young Catholics. In this brochure a few of the residents will take you on a tour of the community for those interested in participating in it or supporting its future spiritually or financially.



Having a place to live which is also a welcoming home to return to in the evening is a vital foundation for all aspects of life and provides the necessary basis for growth as a person. Cooking, praying, laughing, talking, thinking together are a part of daily life at Campus Aquino, as well as the sharing of trials and joys. The students, spread across a number of apartments and houses, gather weekly for a community evening of fellowship, prayer and formation. The young professionals do so monthly.

If life could be compared to climbing a mountain then Campus Aquino is a group of climbers in roped ascent, helping each other onwards. The presence, friendship, help, prayer and insights of others who live with you is one of the best means for growth.

During a typical weekly community night students will cook, eat, share, pray and learn together, all of which offers plenty of opportunity for music and conversation.

# Growing in faith through teaching, discussion and guidance

The desire to learn about the Catholic faith ranks consistently high in the priorities and wishes of the residents.

Emphasis is placed on two means that have proven to be the most useful: teaching and discussion. The brothers strive to teach the Catholic faith through the homilies, catechesis and courses available at Katholieke Studenten Utrecht, the Saint Gerardus Majella parish and the JohannesAcademie - the formation institute of the Brothers of Saint John. The residents at *Campus Aquino* gather regularly for discussions in small groups, seeking together to deepen their faith through the sharing of questions, knowledge, insights and texts from the Bible, Church teaching and authors on faith or on human wisdom for life. This is a great way to go further both in understanding and confidence in

one's ability to advance and to contribute.

Residents regularly help lead Alpha Courses or with charitable work in other parishes in Utrecht. The young professionals have set up and run Katholieke Young Pro's Utrecht with and for others in and around Utrecht - a lively platform for encounter and formation, reaching out to others. Finally, students and young professionals are often in search of guidance in order to progress in personal questions, issues or choices related to faith or the challenges life can present. The brothers provide spiritual advice and guidance, and can help those who need it to find other forms of coaching or help.


Getting the chance to share one's thoughts and seek answers to questions is a crucial part of growth. Living near each other and the brothers provides many opportunities for this.

When I moved to university I was really pleased to be able to live in the student community. It's a friendly environment which helped me to take the step of leaving home. It soon also became clear to me that this is a place where you can develop close friendships which will last long after you finish studies. With time it also helped me to progress from a faith based solely on childhood habits towards a more mature, personal faith, I haven't ever distanced myself from my faith during my years at university but I have struggled with the question of whether it is really "my" faith and not simply loyalty towards my parents. The answers to these questions didn't lie just in my chemistry studies but in finding out how faith and science can walk hand in hand. At those moments it was great to be living close to the church where there's so much opportunity for prayer (and especially, for me, silent adoration) and formation, to have the brothers within reach to whom you can always go with questions, and to have friends who are also involved with the faith. Later on I also learned that however great community is, things don't always go smoothly. But that's also a valuable experience: learning about how you react in the less pleasant circumstances, to hold on to what's important and to not give up. I think these skills will be useful later in life, for example in marriage or in work. I'm now finishing my graduate studies and live in a house with students where I'm the "experienced" housemate. I'm grateful for the chance to share my experience but I also just enjoy all the fun of living with students!

# An environment favouring study and work

The young professionals are just as varied in their disciplines, nurses living alongside software writers and HR assistants, doctors mingling with bakers, theologians, psychologists, chemists and translators.


Living in the student community has a lot of benefits. Besides the enriching friendships, the formation in faith and the room for personal growth, the community provides a motivating environment for study. Our studies take up most of our daily life. We share with each other the joys, enthusiasm and difficulties we encounter in our courses. The fact that we can do this generates a lot of motivation since you know that you're never alone! We often arrange study sessions together and help each other to get through them.

As well as the studies, which are central to our lives here, we also talk about and pray for our future vocation, our master courses or career options. By sharing with each other what we're doing we develop strong bonds of friendship. We hear each other's perspectives on things and include eachother's advice in our discernment. The community therefore helps you to discover what you're called to, with all your talents and qualities. For example, for me personally it has become clear through talking with people here in community and through prayer that I'd love to get into teaching. I have a strong sense that this is my personal vocation. In short, living at Campus Aquino provides you with much support for your studies and a motivating and forming environment which all contributes to an amazing time at university!

# Seek for truth in life's big questions

This is a spirit which the brothers are keen to share with the young people at Campus Aquino. Whether alone with a book from the campus' library, in a one-on-one conversation with a fellow student, young professional or with a brother, or during a group discussion or speaker's night... it is always deeply life-giving to make progress in understanding oneself, life, the faith, God or the world around us. Everyone has something to contribute in our search for truth. Discovering one's ability to think, seek, learn from others,

past and present, and to find answers is an essential tool for life ahead. We foster this endeavour in each person and seek to provide means which can help it: group discussions, courses at the JohannesAcademie, personal guidance and our library, to name a few.

The students at Campus Aquino together run the organisation Katholieke Studenten Utrecht, involving activities with and for students seeking to deepen or discover the Catholic faith.

## Learning to pray and to live with God

Living near a church and priory offers many daily opportunities for prayer. Daily Mass, Eucharistic adoration, confessions and a church open all day make it possible to spend regular time with God in an environment of prayer.

The brothers maintain a daily presence of prayer in the church and the ready availability of the sacraments but they're not the only ones to create times of prayer. Campus Aquino residents organise regular adoration evenings of praise and worship, and often gather in their own homes for evening prayer or the rosary. At community evenings residents pray together and for each other, and often share things they especially need prayer for. Prayer is also a learning curve and the brothers offer help in learning to open one's heart and mind to God and to develop a strong regular life of prayer. Praying gradually aligns one's heart and life with God and opens one up to His Holy Spirit.

This always changes our lives for the better and Jesus leads us to to live ever more truly as sons and daughters of the Father. The Christian way of life is beautiful and demanding and residents seek to allow God to transform their lives and their persons into the Christians of today. This is helped by mutual example, advice and through spiritual guidance.




# Taking steps towards vocation, healing and the big choices in life

For young adults, making choices and taking certain directions in life is clearly of great importance. Time has shown that *Campus Aquino* is a place which helps with that.

While several residents have found their husband or wife here, and others a vocation to religious life or priesthood, all residents have taken major steps towards their future lives: discovering where talents lie, what line of interest or work one wants to develop, what one's strengths and weaknesses are... and seeking to open oneself to God's calling. Important decisions are made in these things and the environment of prayer, fellowship, learning and guidance all helps. This process often involves the discovering of wounds and struggles within oneself and which require special time, attention and help.

Campus Aquino is also a place of shelter and recovery where residents look out for each other and are there in times of need.

The brothers seek to help all residents in the discernment and pursuit of God's vocation in their lives through prayer, guidance and sometimes, where deep healing is needed, in combination with appropriate health care professionals.



In the past ten years on mission here with the students and young pros I've noticed how important it is for young people at this stage in life to have the opportunity and means to gather together and take steps in giving shape to their lives. Young adults are at the stage of making choices for themselves which will affect the rest of their future and those of others. Choices require learning, seeking, praying, receiving advice and guidance, and having the support and encouragement of friends. The brothers consider it a privilege to be able to provide much of that here and it's one of our lasting joys to see the younger generation grow in their faith. Several residents have received a vocation to priesthood or religious life and others have found their spouses. It's wonderful to see the church growing and being renewed in this way. While not every resident receives their specific vocation during their time here, the environment here provides the tools for a good discernment. The students, young pros, brothers and parishioners also see it as a part of our mission to support those of us who are going through hard times. It's deeply moving to see how a home and friends can help us to reach out to God and to traverse life's difficulties and receive the healing and growth we all need in order to be Christ's Church in today's

world.
